From My Life and Family by Dan Joslyn:

In 1919 she had a nervous breakdown and went to the home of a cousin, Lillian Danforth Bonfoey, in Colorado Springs. Daughter Evelyn went to Colorado to give what support she could. Augusta's husband eventually went to Colorado to bring her back.

Augusta lived with her daughter Floy Aileen, "Flossie", in Hot Springs, Arkansas for the last 15 years of her life.

She attended hardin College, a finishing school in Mexico, Missouri. As a young single woman she taught school at Matthews, a small community near Charleston.

Otis Wilbra Joslyn son of Otis Joslyn and Sarah Jane Dresser Libby^[2] was born on 14 Sep 1869 in Saco, York, Maine, USA^[3]. He died on 08 Jan 1949 in Charleston, Mississippi, Missouri, USA^[4].

From a memorial address given by J.M. Haw in the Circuit Court of Mississippi County, Missouri on October 11, 1949. This memorial was included in the records of the court.

Otis Wilbra Joslyn, son of Otis Joslyn and Sarah Jane Joslyn, whose maiden name was Libby, was born in Saco, Maine, September 14, 1869. He died a resident of Charleston, Missouri, January 8, 1949, at the age of 79 years, 3 months and 24 days. He and his family are of that substantial, thrifty, dependable type that might well be called the middle class, so largely responsible for the greatness of this country.

While yet an infant his parents moved to Port Huron, Michigan. He received his academic education in the public schools and in the University of Michigan, where he had two years in mechanical engineering.

In 1890, with his parents, he moved to Whiting, where his father was associated with the Ward

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Lumber Company in the lumber business. Will, as he was called by many of his friends, became foreman of the large saw-milling operations there. While living at Whiting, he became acquainted with Miss Gussie Danforth, member of a prominent Charleston family, who was teaching school there. They were married December 12, 1894. Six children were born of the marriage. His widow, all six of their children, thirteen grandchildren and five great grandchildren survive him.

Sometime after he became a husband and father, Mr. Joslyn decided to become a lawyer. He entered the office of Russell & Deal, one of the prominent law firms of this section, there pursued his studies and was admitted to the practice of law April 6, 1897. At that time a two year course in law was all that was required by the law school of the University of Missouri. He entered that law school in the fall of 1897, took and passed an examination in the subjects required for the junior year, entered the senior class and received his LLB degree in the spring of 1898.

With the knowledge of human nature acquired by working with other men, his association with able lawyers in the practical work of the law, his opportunity to observe the courts, while engaged in the administration of the law, and his year in the school he was, in my opinion, much better prepared to engage in the practice of his profession than are those, who are required to spend the first twenty-five or thirty years of their lives learning from books alone, often taught by those, who have had but little, if any, actual experience in business or in the real practice of law. Many men whose training has been confined to the schools have become good lawyers, but in the early years of their practice, they have been greatly handicapped by their lack of knowledge of the practical side of life.

Mr. Joslyn located in Charleston, his home town, as the field for his life work. His rise to leadership at the Bar of his county was not rapid. Both town and county had a small population and there were a number of able, established lawyers here, and others from nearby counties, who shared, to an extent, the practice here.

Among the members of this Bar were J. J. Russell, a leader in his profession, one time Speaker of the Missouri House of Representatives, Congressman from his district; E. J. Deal, well-known lawyer, attentive to business and long time member of the firm of Russell & Deal, later of Russell, Deal & Russell; W. Clark Russell, one time Probate Judge of this county, later attorney for the Missouri Pacific Railroad Company, and later still a member of the Cape Girardeau County Bar; Harry C. O'Bryan, former Circuit Judge, gifted and eloquent; James A. Boone, unassuming but one of the most skillful lawyers at the Bar, with an unusually wide range of knowledge of the law and of general information; W. G. Lee, who while a member of the State Legislature won the distinction of being the only representative to secure from the State an appropriation toward building a levee in this county; and Charles R. Love, Prosecuting Attorney, afterward Probate Judge of the county. There were many others later, but these were the men with whom O. W. Joslyn had to compete in his early practice.

He was a broad-minded man of many talents. He used them freely in the service of his fellow man, in many fields of action.

From about 1901 to 1905 he was associated with Charles R. Love, who was then Prosecuting Attorney, as Mr. Love's assistant, and as his partner in the civil practice. From January, 1905 to about May 1, 1908, he was Prosecuting Attorney and I was Assistant Prosecuting Attorney under him, and his partner in the civil practice. About May 1st, 1908, he resigned as Prosecuting Attorney and moved to Virginia, where he lived until August, 1910. He then returned to Charleston and became a member of the law firm of Russell & Deal. While Prosecuting Attorney, he met and held his own against the ablest members of the bar.

His first office appears to have been that of City Attorney of the City of Charleston. The City records show that he was appointed to this office February 2, 1899. He held this position until April or May, 1905, soon after he became Prosecuting Attorney. The records show that he again became City Attorney in May, 1921, and served until June, 1937. Chas. E. Kirkpatrick, our Police Judge, who has long been a part of our city government, informed me that at one time when Mr. Joslyn was getting a

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salary of \$50.00 a month, as City Attorney, and the city became financially embarrassed, Mr. Joslyn voluntarily relinquished \$25.00 per month of his salary and turned it back to the city.

He also served his City a number of years as City Councilman and Mayor respectively. He was a member of the Board of Education of Charleston School District for many years, though not all of his terms were served consecutively. He was President of the Board during much of his incumbency. He was also chairman of the Mississippi County Red Cross at a time when that office paid no salary and required much time and work. The disastrous 1927 flood from the Mississippi River occurred while he held that office. He never held an office that paid a substantial salary. It seems, however, that until the latter part of his life, whenever there was a job that called for much work and little or no money compensation, it called to him and he responded. In addition to the positions above mentioned, he was Chairman of the County Democratic Committee for several years, and an elder in his church and Sunday School teacher, at all of which he was unusually capable and efficient. He was also a Mason. he was a recognized leader in all of his activities.

His was a constructive mind. As Prosecuting Attorney, he created a high standard for those who followed him in that office. In doing this he had the splendid cooperation of Sam Paris, who was in charge of the office of Sheriff as deputy under C. S. DeField. They worked in harmony, a practice that is absolutely essential to the discouragement of crime and the creation of respect for the law. He was not one of those who boast of never losing a jury case. HE did not shun the difficult cases and try only those in which he was certain of conviction. He well knew that there were cases where the guilt was clear, but the chances of conviction were uncertain and that prosecution of such cases was both a deterrent to the offenders and means of familiarizing the public with conditions and awakening their conscience to the extent that convictions for future offenses could be had.

Local option was adopted in this County in December, 1903. Constant vigilance was necessary to make it effective. By their vigilance and fine team work, Mr. Joslyn and Mr. Paris secured the conviction of several chronic violators, some of them of considerable prominence, and created respect for the law on the part of some, who had doubted the advisability of its adoption, and fear of it on the part of would-be violators. Mr. Joslyn, himself, had serious doubts as to the successful administration of this law prior to its adoption, but he was thoroughly convinced of its benefits, after he saw it in operation in this county.

With the aid of a detective these two officers convicted some notorious gamblers, permanently broke up their business, and caused them to leave the county.

Mr. Joslyn also made good use of the grand jury in uncovering and discouraging crime. He found it a most valuable aid in the efficient administration of the law and used it regularly.

He felt established lawlessness was a challenge to the law and its administrators. He was never a man to dodge or refuse a challenge. He could not be bought, intimidated nor cajoled. He was as free from fear as any man I ever knew. His administration of his office was proof that while some new laws may be needed from time to time, a much greater need is for men, who will conscientiously and faithfully administer the laws we already have, as their oaths of office require them to do. There will be fulfilled the prayer of Josiah Gilbert Holland in his poem "Wanted".

"God give us men! A Time like this demands
Strong minds, great hearts, true faith and ready hands;
Men whom the lust of office does not kill;
Men whom the spoils of office cannot buy;
Men who possess opinions and a will;
Men who have honor; - men who will not lie;
And damn his treacherous flatteries without winking!
Tall men, sun-crowned, who live above the fog
For while the rabble, with their thumb-worn creeds,

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Their large professions and their little deeds,
Mingle in selfish strife, lo! Freedom weeps,
Wrong rules the land, and waiting Justice sleeps!"

Much of Mr. Joslyn's constructive work in his civil practice was done in connection with the formation of several of the drainage districts of this county. The preparation of the legal papers in this work was important and required great care. The trials in court also required skill and labor. In most of this work he had the able assistance of Mr. L. T. Berthe, capable engineer of Charleston, whose work in this profession is outstanding.

(Mr. Joslyn would wish the good work done by his associates in his various undertakings fully recognized and acknowledged.)

Three of the four public school buildings in Charleston were erected while he was a member of the Board of Education and our school system was recognized as among the best. I understand its rank is still high.

He was never driven by ambition, either for high public office or for fame in his profession. He was content to do his work in his home county and let others seek a wider fame and larger fortune. If there was any office that would require his traveling to other counties that he would have liked to occupy, it was that of Judge of the Circuit Court. His friends would have been glad to have seen him in that office, and so informed him, but because of his defective hearing, he felt that he would be handicapped in the performance of its duties and he never thought seriously of becoming a candidate for it. He would have made an able judge.

In his long practice of the law, O. W. Joslyn was never without a partner for any great length of time. Besides those already mentioned, he was at various times associated with W. Clark Russell, with Thomas J. Brown, once a member of the Constitutional Convention and later Chairman of the Missouri Public Service Commission, with James A. Boone, than whom he never had a closer friend, and later with his own son, Lewis Danforth Joslyn. He had the satisfaction of seeing this son become State Representative, Prosecuting Attorney; State Senator and Circuit Judge respectively. From the time he got out of law school, Wm. P. Wright, Jr. was also in the office of Joslyn & Joslyn.

Among his other fine traits Mr. Joslyn found great delight in helping younger lawyers. He felt highly complimented when they came to him with their problems and sought his advice. His judgment was sound and his counsel wise.

Although born in Maine and reared in Michigan, he was a staunch Democrat, but not so blindly partisan that he would refuse to cross party lines and vote for a candidate on the opposing ticket, if he thought the candidate of his party was not a good Democrat or that his election would be injurious to his country.

Among mortal men Gen. Robert E. Lee appeared to be his highest ideal. He was a tireless reader of biographies of Gen. Lee and of all other writings about him that came to his notice.

The types of characters he admired are evidenced by those whose pictures he kept on the walls of his office. They are: Jesus Christ, William Jennings Bryan, Robert E. Lee, Abraham Lincoln, Grover Cleveland, Woodrow Wilson and Franklin D. Roosevelt. He was not fully in accord with some of the policies of the last named that tend to destroy States rights and bestow so much power on the Federal Government, nor did he like to see the traditional limitation of the presidency to two terms destroyed. Nevertheless, he thought Mr. Roosevelt a great man.

He loved farming and had an opportunity to indulge his fondness for it by looking after a farm of several hundred acres for a client, as well as operating his own lands. A few days ago one of the prominent and successful farmers of this County remarked that Mr. Joslyn was an able farmer and

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that had he turned his attention to farming, he would have made an outstanding success of it.

This sketch would not be complete without a word about its subject as a family man. He loved his family, his wife, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, and was loved by them. He was proud of them and had reason to be. He would undergo any sacrifice for them - was a good husband and a good father. He and Mrs. Joslyn did a splendid service in the rearing of their children, giving them splendid training and opportunities, and were gratified at the results.

Though unpretentious about it, Mr. Joslyn was deeply and sincerely religious. Once, when greatly distressed, he told me he was praying, not that he be relieved of his burden, but that he be given the strength to bear it like a man. This was typical of him. His great desire was that he prove to be a real man under all circumstances.

Let none think it is the purpose of this tribute to a close friend to unduly praise or flatter him. While he highly appreciated sincere commendation for work well done, he despised flattery and fulsome praise. He was human, but he was endowed with, and made use of, many of the most admirable and useful qualities that go to make up a man. It may be well said of him:

"His life was gentle; and the elements
So mixed in him, that nature might stand up
And say to all the world, 'This was a man!'"

For the last several years of his life, his health was not good, but until the very last, he went to his office and his work daily. At last his summons came and he died, as he wished to die, in his home, calmly, peacefully and unafraid, without being helpless and a burden to his loved ones, a fitting end to a long, unassuming and useful life. None have left a more affectionate family, more sincere friends or more appreciative neighbors.

Despite the fact that I shall sadly miss his frequent call to me, as I passed his office, to come in, his frequent visits to my office, the comradely and interesting discussions we so often had, covering all phases of life, his wise counsel, and our close friendship, in view of the fact his fine life's work was done and the infirmities of age were beginning to close in on him, I can say in the language of the poet:

"I am glad that he has lived thus long,
And glad that he has gone to his reward;
Nor deem, that kindly nature did him wrong,
Softly to disengage the vital cord,
When his weak hand grew palsied, and his eye
Dark with the mists of age, it was his time to die."

From a series titled "Charleston Had It All" in the Charleston Enterprise Courier:

Otis W. Joslyn worked in the offices of Prosecuting Attorney Charles Love and Congressman J. J. Russell. In 1897 he received a law degree from Missouri Uni-versity after attending only the senior year.²

Joslyn likely rented office space in the Russell building when it first opened in 1907.

He and perhaps Attorney Thomas Brown, Sr. moved up-stairs in 1921 when John Russell purchased the building to locate Farmers' Exchange Bank.

When the bank moved from the Russell building in 1926, the Joslyn Law Firm packed up its law books and carried them back downstairs to the corner suite where it had been.

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Attorney Otis Wilbra Joslyn was born in 1869 in Saco, Maine. When he came to Whiting, Mississippi County in 1890 he already had two years of mechanical engineering at the University of Michigan under his belt. Joslyn came to be foreman of a sawmill, which was owned by Ward Lumber Company.³

"When Otis arrived, there was a huge tract of virgin timber in Mississippi County, a lumber-man's paradise. This part of Missouri had not yet been well-developed, partly because it had not yet been drained by a system of ditches to make it suitable for agriculture. The water level was high and gave rise to swamps....

"With its swamps, forests, and the nearby great rivers, Mississippi County harbored many kinds of wildlife: ducks, geese, turkey, quail, deer, rac-coons, possums, rabbits, wolves, wild cats, and a thinning population of now extinct passenger pigeons...

"While in Whiting, Otis met a young school teacher, Augusta Nolan "Gussie" Danforth, daughter of a well-to-do lumber merchant [Lewis W. Danforth] from nearby Charleston. Otis and Gussie were married ...and set up housekeeping in Charleston. 4

Attorney O. W. Joslyn was civic minded, kind, and generous in helping others who came to learn from him. He was highly respected.

The article cites Dan Jolsyn's My Life and Family.

The 1930 census gives address as 106 Danforth St. His sister-in-law Grace Darling Danforth is listed at the same address.

From My Life and Times, by Dan Joslyn:

He was born in the old Libby house in Saco which had been in his Mother's family for generations. All cooking there was done over a huge fireplace.

His parents and sister Bertha had already moved to Michigan when he was born. His mother returned to her parents' home to have him.

The first time his new wife served him the noon meal, he bellowed, "Where's the potatoes?" A neighbor boy who had joined them for lunch went running from the room. His wife always served potatoes after that.

He chewed tobacco and smoked a pipe in front of the coal-burning fireplace in the living room. He kept a trunk of cured but uncut tobacco leaves in the pantry. He liked to listen to St. Louis Cardinals baseball games on the radio.

He loved the land and could frequently be found tending his garden at 4:00 A.M if he was having trouble sleeping.

He and his wife quickly started having children. When he was in law school, a fellow law student teasingly asked him for advice on siring children. He replied, "Ask your wife to put on her finest perfume and nightie and ... call me."

In the Spring of 1908 the family, excepting the two oldest children, Otis and Evelyn, moved to Mathews County, Virginia, close to where his brother Frank lived, on the banks of the Painkatank River. Otis and Evelyn stayed with their Danforth grandparents. The family returned to Missouri in Summer, 1910.

He spent a night atop Pike's Peak and had unsettling nightmares. He was in Colorado Springs to pick

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up his wife, who was staying with a friend there after having had a nervous breakdown.

Otis Wilbra Joslyn and Augusta Nolan Danforth were married on 12 Dec 1894 in Whiting, Mississippi, Missouri, USA^[5, 6]. They had 6 children.

2. **Lewis William Danforth** son of Leander Foster Danforth and Jane Woodfork Jones^[7] was born on 10 Jun 1837 in Henderson, Kentucky, USA^[7, 8]. He died on 30 Jan 1917 in Charleston, Mississippi, Missouri, USA.

Daughter Nettie wrote: "L.W. Danforth with his wife and baby ('Little Minnie') moved from Henderson Ky. to Charleston, Mo in 1861, probably in the spring. The Federal forces were then campaigning to gain possession of the Miss. River and 'starve out' the Confederacy. General Grant, who had not, as yet, achieved his great fame as a General, was in command of the activities and was very much in evidence around Cairo. Of course Mr. Danforth had to 'get through the lines' in order to enter South East Missouri with even what little baggage he had, the largest piece of which was a small trunk. The Federal authorities were, of course, keeping a sharp lookout for 'contraband.' During the inspection of Mr. Danforth, his family and baggage, General Grant (indicating the small trunk) remarked pleasantly -- 'I don't suppose you have a cannon in that trunk.' Mr. Danforth assured the General, that the trunk did not contain a cannon.

"Mr. Danforth, with his young wife and baby daughter, made the trip from Henderson Ky to Cairo on one of the small Ohio River Packets. Among the passengers was a Federal Captain and his wife. I think my mother used to say the name was Captain Largo, though I am not sure, nor have I any means of checking up on the matter. Anyway, Mrs. Largo was drawn to the young mother and pretty baby and asked my mother if she would accept a little gift for the baby. The gift was a strand of red and white coral beads with a gold clasp. Emily has what is left of the gift. On clasp is 1861 M.D. also

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1869 G.D.D." "Capt. Lago" is written at the end.

Daughter Grace wrote: "When Papa and Mama married in 1860 in St. L. they had to go by boat from there to Henderson. On the boat from Cairo Ill they met Capt. and Mrs. Lago. In conversation they told of wedding. She had gone with her Uncle Tom Poor and his wife Ann Smith Poor, papa's cousin in their honeymooning to St. L. when papa met them, because her gr.mother and Uncle Woodson Poor, with whom she (mother ?? dead) then lived objected to her marrying papa, Uncle TP approved. So Mama slipped away. We teased her of running away. So when meeting Lagos 2nd time, Mrs. Lago said 'here is our little runaway couple.' (Married Sept 26, 1860 Minnie born July 7 1861. d Mch 13 1865 Measles. buried Oak Grove C. here"

From the Annual Report of the Missouri Horticultural Society, 1890:

Charleston, Mo., June 2, 1890.

L. A. Goodman, Secretary, Poplar Bluff, Mo.:

I very much regret my inability to attend the meeting of the Missouri State Horticultural society at Poplar Bluff, June 3, 4 and 5. Our fruit crop will be an average one. Our melon vines are looking well, and the weather for the past week has been very fine for them. The yield per acre will be good. The average will be about 65 per cent of the usual plant. Wet weather in the early spring caused a great many acres of land to lie idle. An early shipment is now looked for. The Kolb-Gen is the only variety raised here for shipping purposes. In the year 1888 there were shipped from the melon belt over 2,600 carloads ; 1889, about 1,500; this year about the same as last year. Shipping will begin earlier this year than last.

In the documents of the House of Representatives, 62nd Congress, 3rd Session, December 2 1912 - March 4 1913:

Washington, D. C., April 19, 1912.

Dear General: I to-day received a letter from Lieut. George W. Danforth, who has been the officer in charge of the relief work at Charleston, Mo., also a telegram from L. W. Danforth, president of the county court of that county, asking me to try to obtain permission from the Army officers to furnish the common tents which they now have to the destitute and homeless sufferers from the flood, whose houses have been destroyed or washed away and left them homeless. Also a request, if possible, to permit them to retain the common blankets or bedding and to furnish more bedding, if possible, for the destitute of the flooded district.

I hope that you can find some way of granting this request, as I know it to be very greatly needed and will be of very great benefit to people who are left homeless and utterly destitute by reason of the ravages of the recent high water. I would be glad to have you advise me as soon as the matter can be determined. Very truly, yours,

From My Life and Family by Dan Joslyn:

Lewis W. Danforth was a Confederate spy. One of General Grant's early engagements during the Civil War was the Battle of Belmont, which occurred in Missouri just across the Mississippi River from Kentucky. On the Missouri side was a large tract of virgin timber which he knew in intimate detail. General Grant and his reconnaissance party got lost in this huge forest and met up with Danforth, who

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showed them back to their camp.

The next day, Danforth was apprehended, brought into camp, and presented to General Grant on suspicion of being a spy. Grant ordered his release based on his assistance the day before. At this time Danforth happened to have hidden in his boot a message from one Confederate general with instructions to deliver it to another.

According to two of his daughters, Danforth was later captured by the Federals, presumably for spying, and held for a time in the Gratiot Prison in St. Louis.

He was recognized as a wit, a good story teller, and a gifted amateur actor. He started out in the marble business with his father and first came to Missouri as a tombstone salesman on horseback.

He met his future wife Mary Jane Yates around 1857 at a fair in Charleston, Missouri, about 14 miles from the Kentucky border. The fair was held to celebrate the completion of the railroad into Charleston.

After moving to Charleston in 1862 Danforth owned and operated a retail lumber business. A sign at the lumber business read: "We sell on time, not eternity!".

3. **Mary Jane Yates** daughter of Willis Browning Yates and Mary Jane Amanda Ellen Poor was born on 23 Jun 1843 in Port Royal, Montgomery, Tennessee, USA^[8, 9, 10]. She died on 02 May 1914 in Charleston, Mississippi, Missouri, USA^[1].

Lewis William Danforth and Mary Jane Yates were married on 26 Sep 1860 in Monroe House, St. Louis, Missouri^[11, 12]. They had the following children:

When the Civil War broke out, the Danforth family was split in its sympathies. Although Albert did not believe in slavery and never owned a slave, his loyalties were all with the South and he joined the Confederate Army as a lieutenant. He never talked much about his war experiences, but his friend Uncle Will Swank did. Swank was not a blood relative, but because of his close friendship with their father, he was known to the Danforth boys as Uncle Will. Lieutenants Danforth and Swank were in charge of transporting supplies across the Mississippi River, around Cairo, Illinois, a highly precarious assignment because the whole area was overrun with Union troops and roving bands of guerrillas. They commanded the first troops to capture Union prisoners west of the Mississippi, and came close to capture themselves on many occasions.

Will got a hearty laugh out of Uncle Will's story about the time he and Lieutenant Danforth were surprised by a band of Union guerrillas. They hid in the attic of a farmhouse while the Union soldiers ate lunch on the floor below. Everything went well until a swarm of bees came through the open attic window. Swank called this the Battle of the Bees and said it called for more courage to stay quiet among those bees than it did to face any guerrillas.

Another time Lieutenant Danforth was almost captured was one night when he had ridden into Charleston to call on a young lady named Rebecca Lynn. His horse was tied outside her home when a troop of Union cavalry rode into town. Rebecca hid Albert in a closet and his horse in a patch of high weeds until the Union troops had passed on. Not long after that incident, Albert asked Rebecca to be his wife. They were married before the war ended.

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Rebecca Lynn made an ideal wife for Albert Danforth. She was happy, outgoing, and a friend of everybody in town. He was quiet and inclined to worry and introspection. She came from English and Scotch immigrant stock, which had first settled in Maryland and later emigrated to Kentucky. After Rebecca and her brother became orphans, they moved to Charleston, Missouri, where they set up a small drug store. She was flattered when the young lieutenant courted her. He came from one of the town's leading families. He had been to college in Indiana whereas her family could not afford anything but grade school. She was determined her children were going to have the best education they could possibly afford.
